



Great Progress Achieved Amid Unprecedented Drama By Kevin Brinegar, President, Indiana Chamber of Commerce

The 2011 General Assembly was remarkable on a variety of fronts.

Despite all the twists and turns – punctuated by the historic, five-week walkout by House Democrats – the session still concluded on schedule.

More importantly, many positive

policies were passed to support economic expansion and a number of reforms will really make a difference for Hoosiers and their families. Significant negative legislation was defeated altogether or rendered virtually harmless.

The much-needed changes in the K-12 education arena were sweeping and momentous – the likes of which we haven't seen since Governor Orr's A+ program in 1987. The overhaul of the state's unemployment system early in the session now has employers and those receiving benefits more equally sharing in the burden, while saving employers \$2 billion in unemployment taxes.

A 2% drop in the state's corporate income tax rate will benefit thousands of small businesses and their employees. Local governments can now completely exempt new purchases of machinery and equipment from property taxes for up to 10 years. Several positive environmental and energy enhancements – some several years in the making – were passed in 2011.

Very harsh immigration legislation was sidelined, including the "three strikes" provision, in favor of a relatively benign immigration law that's a far cry from the Arizona model. Many costly pieces of health care legislation were defeated, including "assignment of benefits" that would have dramatically increased the costs of health care for employers and employees.

One high-profile issue that did not cross the finish line

was local government reform. Meaningful attempts to initiate structural reforms to provide better service and save taxpayer dollars were shot down – despite plenty of evidence of the need for change. This tells us once again of the depth of influence back home of local government officials determined not to see real reforms.

Many legislators deserve our recognition and appreciation for their sincere efforts to make Indiana a better place to work and live. Was your legislator part of the solution or part of the problem? The answers can be found in this publication.

Legislative Vote Analysis is the most complete and definitive publication on the voting records of Indiana state legislators on business issues. This report describes the bills most important to companies and their employees from the 2011 session of the Indiana General Assembly, the Chamber's position on each and a score summarizing the voting record of each legislator.

There are two vote scores for each legislator. The first score represents the 2011 voting record, while the second represents a two-year aggregate voting percentage. Legislators who have a vote score of 70% or greater are eligible for consideration for endorsement by the Indiana Chamber's non-partisan political action committee, Indiana Business for Responsive Government (IBRG).

Developing the Business Agenda

The Indiana Chamber provides more information on important pro-economy, pro-jobs issues to legislators and businesspersons than any other organization in the state. In preparation for the legislative session, each year the Chamber's numerous policy committees study the various public policy issues impacting businesses and formulate positions on these issues.

Following review and adoption by the Chamber's board of directors, a publication titled *Legislative Business Issues* is sent to all legislators. This publication outlines the Chamber's position on important public policy issues and provides invaluable analysis.

During the legislative sessions, lawmakers are kept apprised of key issues through various editions of the *Legislative Agenda* report and other communications that detail the Chamber's position on every bill that has a jobs or economic impact. There were 257 such bills as the 2011 legislative session began. All that reached a floor vote without significant change are included in this report and scoring.

The 2011 Legislative Vote Analysis then measures the voting performance of individual legislators on bills that best reflect the Chamber's policy positions.

Bills Used for Vote Analysis

SJR 10 (Third Reading) Right to Secret Ballot in Union Elections

Authored by Sen. Banks. Provided the right to vote by secret ballot in union organizing elections. **Chamber Position: Support.** The right to vote by secret ballot is one of our country's most fundamental rights and should be preserved for all elections. Employees shouldn't face intimidation or coercion in voting for union organizing. **Died**

SB 1 (Second Reading Amendment #1) Weakening Teacher Performance Measures; Charter School Restrictions

Authored by Sen. Skinner. Would have eliminated licensing flexibility for charter school teachers and deleted ban on salary increases for poorly performing teachers. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Charter schools have demonstrated the value of using alternatively and/or unlicensed teachers, a practice that ought to be explored by more schools not stifled. Additionally, allowing pay increases for poorly performing teachers would continue the ineffective practice of treating all teachers the same rather than paying them based on their performance. **Amendment Failed**

SB 1 (Second Reading Amendment #4) Limiting Teacher Performance-Based Evaluations and Pay

Authored by Sen. Skinner. Would have limited teacher performance-based pay to new teachers only. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have perpetuated the current ineffective systems for the vast majority of teachers. **Amendment Failed**

SB 1 (Concurrence)

Teacher Performance-Based Evaluations and Pay

Authored by Sen. Kruse. Provides for performance-based pay for teachers. Restructures evaluation processes to include measures of student academic performance and creates teacher evaluation categories with consequences. Eliminates layoff procedures and salary schedules based entirely on seniority. **Chamber Position: Support.** Improves the evaluation process and accountability provisions for teachers. **Signed by Governor**

SB 23 (Third Reading)

Hoosier Commission for Communities for a Lifetime

Authored by Sen. Simpson. Created the Hoosier Commission for Communities for a Lifetime. **Chamber Position: Support.** This commission would examine important community and economic development issues that were brought up in the Indiana Chamber's recent Workforce Wise study. **Died**

SB 26 (Third Reading)

Local Government Reorganization and Merger

Authored by Sen. Head. Allows a political subdivision to retain a part of its levy and budget that would otherwise be reduced because of savings from a government reorganization or

township merger. **Chamber Position: Support.** Allows local units of government to defray one-time transition costs from a possible merger that would come from the projected savings from the current levy. It enhances the potential for other local government mergers. **Signed by Governor**

SB 32 (Third Reading) Vote Center Option for All Counties

Authored by Sen. Alting. Establishes the use of vote centers as an option for all counties. Chamber Position: Support. Vote centers have been tested in several Indiana counties for several years with great success. They enhance convenience for voters and reduce the cost of elections. Signed by Governor

SB 47 (Third Reading) Various Riverboat Matters

Authored by Sen. Alting. Permits a licensed owner to convert a riverboat into a permanently moored vessel without propulsion or navigation equipment. Removes obsolete provisions. Eliminates certain restrictions. Chamber Position: Support. There is no point in requiring these businesses to comply with expensive regulations related to excursion boats when they are permanently moored. The state has become dependent on revenues from these operations and they should not be unduly hampered. Signed by Governor

SB 54 (Third Reading) Local Regulation of Video Service Franchises

Authored by Sen. Holdman. Provides that a local unit of government may not: (1) regulate a holder of a certificate to provide, or a provider of, video service in Indiana; and (2) establish or fund an entity to regulate a holder or provider. **Chamber Position: Support.** Will lead to further deregulation of telecommunications services in Indiana and eliminate needless local government bureaucracy. **Signed by Governor**

Vote Selection Criteria

The Indiana Chamber has well-established criteria for selecting votes to be included in the *Legislative Vote Analysis* (LVA). Bills included meet the following four criteria:

- 1. Votes on all subject matter used in LVA are based on and best reflect the Chamber's legislative policy as determined by the Chamber's board of directors and expressed in *Legislative Business Issues*, *Legislative Agenda* or other Chamber communications to legislators.
- 2. Each member of the Indiana General Assembly is informed of all bills the Chamber is following, including the Chamber's position on each, the reason for the position, and the name and contact information of the specific Chamber issue expert to contact for more information.
- 3. Each member of the Indiana General Assembly is informed of the Chamber's position on the issue and bill prior to the vote. This notification was provided in editions of the *Legislative Agenda* and other written bill analyses.
- 4. Only floor votes for which there is a public record are used.

SB 61 (Third Reading)

School Board Elections Moved to the Fall

Authored by Sen. C. Lawson. Provides that school board members selected by election must be elected at general elections beginning in 2012. Repeals provisions related to the election of school board members at the primary election. Chamber Position: Support. School boards play critical roles in setting local tax rates and in their oversight of local public schools. Yet, most school board members are elected during primary elections in the spring when voter turnout is typically at its lowest. Moving all school board elections to the fall as part of general elections will help increase voter participation and involvement of the public in the oversight of local public schools. Amended into HB 1074 and Signed by Governor

SB 63 (Third Reading) Suspension of Local Office Holders

Authored by Sen. Gard. Allowed a local elected officeholder to be suspended from office if charged with certain felonies or misdemeanors. Required a two-thirds majority of the legislative body to find that the offense is relevant to the official's suitability for office and that it is in the best interests of the unit that the official be suspended from office. **Chamber Position: Support.** This is a smart good government initiative to not allow a person to serve in a public office if they are charged with certain felonies. **Died**

SB 66 (Concurrence) Expansion of Renewable Energy Resources

Authored by Sen. Gard. Creates additional renewable energy resources in statute to provide financial incentives for clean coal and energy projects. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports a cost-effective fuel mix including clean coal technologies, natural gas, domestic petroleum, nuclear and renewables. An expansion of renewables that allows flexibility and diversity helps promote the state's renewable portfolio. **Signed by Governor**

SB 71 (Concurrence)

Coal Bed Methane and Other Oil and Gas Issues

Authored by Sen. Gard. Creates numerous conditions that affect the mining of coal bed methane. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports the use of coal bed methane as a viable source of energy so long as its extraction is done in a safe and environmentally responsible manner. **Signed by Governor**

SB 72 (Third Reading)

Carbon Dioxide Pipelines and Eminent Domain

Authored by Sen. Gard. Would have established procedures for the issuance by the Department of Natural Resources of a carbon dioxide transmission pipeline certificate of authority that allows construction, operation and maintenance of a pipeline and the use of eminent domain for those purposes. **Chamber Position: Support.** The regulation and control of carbon dioxide may become a major issue as our state consumes over 70 million tons of coal a year in the production of energy. The delineation of respective duties and responsibilities

prior to need is prudent. Any eminent domain action related to a carbon dioxide pipeline should follow existing procedures to provide all parties adequate protection. **Died**

SB 78 (Conference Committee Report) Identification Requirements for Alcohol Purchases

Authored by Sen. Merritt. Makes it a Class B misdemeanor for an alcoholic beverage permittee or an employee or agent of the permittee to recklessly, knowingly or intentionally sell, barter, exchange, provide or furnish another person who is or reasonably appears to be less than 40 years of age an alcoholic beverage for consumption off the licensed premises without first requiring the person to produce specified identification showing that the person is at least 21 years of age. Chamber Position: Support. The Indiana Chamber supports repeal of Indiana's onerous law requiring persons and businesses selling alcoholic beverages to seek identification/proof of age from all purchasers. Employee training, use of common sense and good faith efforts to seek identification from purchasers who may be under the legal age of 21 are sufficient. The current (and recently enacted) law has proven unworkable and unpopular. Signed by Governor

SB 86 (Concurrence)

Unemployment Benefits Qualifications and Controlled Substances

Authored by Sen. Leising. An applicant for employment that fails or refuses to take a drug test as a condition of employment is deemed to have refused suitable work and is denied unemployment benefits. **Chamber Position: Support.** Persons abusing drugs should not be permitted to collect unemployment benefits. **Signed by Governor**

SB 87 (Third Reading) Contracts for Dental Services

Authored by Sen. Leising. Prohibited dental insurers and health maintenance organizations from requiring dentists to accept certain payments. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Insurers setting reimbursement rates on non-covered dental services save money for the individual on their out-of-pocket expenses. Some employers request this cost saving as a benefit for employees. **Died**

SB 97 (Third Reading) Funding of Lawsuits

Authored by Sen. Head. Would have established a procedure by which a company could provide a loan to the plaintiff in an action in exchange for the contingent right to receive a part of the potential proceeds of the action. Chamber Position: Oppose. Would only add to our courts' backlog of cases by encouraging people with doubtful claims to file a lawsuit. Also, a plaintiff who has received an upfront payment may be more reluctant to settle a case on a reasonable basis. Finally, a plaintiff, in addition to paying an attorney on a contingent fee basis, would see more of his award go to the funding company. Died

SB 159 (Concurrence)

Streamlined Environmental Rulemaking

Authored by Sen. Gard. Provides that, if the state adopts a federal rule that later should be invalidated the state has an expedited process to remove the invalidated state rule. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports the repeal of any rule for which the federal directive no longer exists. Such a rule should not be enforced and the state should repeal the rule as soon as possible. **Signed by Governor**

SB 166 (Third Reading) Officeholder Qualifications

Authored by Sen. C. Lawson. Would have prohibited nepotism and conflict of interest for a county, city or town officeholder/candidate. Chamber Position: Support. We need to eliminate the conflict of interest regarding an employee of a unit of local government also serving on its legislative or fiscal body. All officeholders – whether they are located in a rural county or not – should be held accountable to ethical conflict of interest and nepotism codes. Died

SB 196 (Third Reading)

Head Start Employment and Unemployment Benefits

Authored by Sen. Boots. Provided that unemployment benefits would not be paid to an individual employed by a Head Start or an Early Head Start program for a week during a period between two successive academic years or terms if the individual performs the employment in the first academic year or term and there is a reasonable assurance that the individual will be employed in the second academic year or term. Chamber Position: Support. The original intent of the unemployment system was to provide a safety net for people who had lost their job through no fault of their own and who did not have a reasonable expectation of employment. It was not the intent of the system to pay people who may be unemployed for a short period of time but who have a reasonable expectation of employment. Died

SB 200 (Concurrence)

IDEM Administrative Issuance of Water Permits

Authored by Sen. Gard. Transfers the power to issue water permits from the Water Pollution Control Board to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM). Also contains provisions related to coal mine general permits. **Chamber Position: Support.** This will satisfy a concern of the Environmental Protection Agency to not have the Water Board issue permits but to move that responsibility to IDEM. The Chamber supports the timely and fair issuance of permits. **Signed by Governor**

SB 202 (Third Reading)

Environmental Approvals and Other Issues

Authored by Sen. Gard. Created procedures for the construction and handling of manure facilities, energy production facilities and requires the state chemist to adopt rules concerning the staging and use of organic fertilizer material. Established provisions for fertilizer materials. Chamber Position: Support. The use of byproduct material from agricultural operations may have beneficial application so long as it is handled and applied in a manner that protects the public health and

environment. The Chamber supports the production of energy realized by the processing of agricultural products. Additionally, the proper handling of fertilizer products that do not violate water quality standards is supported. **Died**

SB 222 (Third Reading) Transportation and Logistics Income Tax Credit

Authored by Sen. Wyss. Provided a Hoosier business investment tax credit for implementing Homeland Security measures to comply with federal Homeland Security requirements. Limited the Hoosier business investment tax credit to \$10,000,000 per year for all taxpayers. Chamber Position: Support. Would have provided an incentive and assistance to Indiana businesses facing compliance issues with federal homeland security program mandates. Died

SB 260 (Third Reading) Clean Energy Improvement Financing District

Authored by Sen. Merritt. Allows a political subdivision to establish a clean energy improvement financing district for the purpose of issuing bonds to fund clean energy improvements for voluntary participants in the program. Chamber Position: Support. Energy conservation is one of the elements of the Chamber's energy policy as a method to decrease our energy demand and promote cost savings for Indiana businesses and industries. Died

SB 292 (Conference Committee Report) Guns in Public Buildings

Authored by Sen. Tomes. Prohibits units of local government from maintaining policies prohibiting guns from being brought into public buildings. **Chamber Position: Oppose**. To protect public safety, a unit of government should have the power to prohibit guns from being brought into public buildings. **Signed by Governor**

SB 294 (Third Reading) Probationary Teacher Contracts

Authored by Sen. Holdman. Would have allowed new teachers to be hired on 60-day probationary periods. **Chamber Position: Support.** Would have established a hiring safeguard that is typical of most other employment settings. **Died**

SB 302 (Third Reading) Officeholder Qualifications

Authored by Sen. C. Lawson. Prohibited nepotism and conflict of interest for a county, city or town officeholder/candidate. **Chamber Position: Support.** Would have eliminated the conflict of interest regarding an employee of a unit of local government also serving on its legislative or fiscal body. All officeholders – whether they are located in a rural county or not – should be held accountable to ethical conflict of interest and nepotism codes. **Died**

SB 303 (Third Reading) Option for Single County Executive

Authored by Sen. C. Lawson. Would have created the option for a single county executive with a county commissioner vote. **Chamber Position: Support.** Allowed for the possibility

for the three county executives to unanimously vote for a voter referendum to go to a single county executive and to transfer the legislative powers of the county executives to the county council. The Chamber supports the concept of this option but believes that it should not have to be a unanimous vote of the commissioners to initiate the voter referendum. **Died**

SB 346 (Concurrence)

Statute of Limitations in Underground Storage Tank Cleanup

Authored by Sen. Gard. Establishes a clear starting point for the statute of limitations in cases where a cleanup from underground storage tanks is needed. **Chamber Position: Support.** As the court system has no clear and consistent point at which the statute of limitations begins, the efficient cleanup of contaminated properties is impaired. This identifies a consistent date from which the party cleaning up a site may go back (10 years) to recover costs from responsible parties. **Signed by Governor**

SB 381 (Conference Committee Report) Tax Representatives

Authored by Sen. Charbonneau. Provides that certain local officials of a county or their employees may not serve as a tax representative for any taxpayer with respect to property subject to property taxes in the same county before the county property tax assessment board of appeals of that county or the Indiana Board of Tax Review. **Chamber Position: Support.** This bill reduces the potential for conflicts of interest and appearance of improprieties associated with contractual relationships between tax representatives and county officials involved in property tax appeals. **Signed by Governor**

SB 386 (Third Reading) Local Government Modernization

Authored by Sen. Waltz. Required additional financial impact information and changes voting blocks for local government modernization efforts. **Chamber Position: Support.** The fiscal impact information verified by the Department of Local Government Finance on a potential merger makes sense. **Died**

SB 405 (Second Reading Amendment #4) Weakening Township Government Reform Measure

Authored by Sen. R. Young. Would have removed the most significant parts of the bill that addressed township government reform, including retaining the township advisory boards and allowing nepotism for township employees. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** This amendment watered down the bill too much and would have left only very minor reforms. **Amendment Failed**

SB 405 (Third Reading) Township Government Reform

Authored by Sen. C. Lawson. Transferred fiscal responsibility for township government to the county council and eliminated township boards. Added in other township reform measures. **Chamber Position: Support.** Would have eliminated township advisory boards and transferred their duties to the county councils, eliminated nepotism, required townships to

post phone number/address in a phone directory and adopt countywide poor relief standards. **Died**

SB 411 (Third Reading) Disclosure of Guns in the Workplace

Authored by Sen. Nugent. Prohibits employers from obtaining information as to whether employees are bringing guns to work. Chamber Position: Oppose. An employer has the right to know whether someone has brought a firearm onto the employer's property. Current law already provides a remedy for an employee who believes that he has been discriminated against because he brought a firearm onto the employer's property pursuant to IC 34-28-7. Signed by Governor

SB 433 (Concurrence) Clarification of IDEM Duties and Authority

Authored by Sen. Gard. Addresses multiple issues related to Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) activities to create efficiencies, clarification and makes technical corrections. **Chamber Position: Support.** Clarifies and creates efficiencies that will allow IDEM to perform more effectively. **Signed by Governor**

SB 441 (Third Reading) Public Works Project Contracts

Authored by Sen. Hershman. Would have increased the cost threshold of projects that the Department of Natural Resources could have performed without awarding a public works contract from \$75,000 to \$150,000. Increased the cost of projects that some political subdivisions could perform without awarding a public works contract from \$100,000 to \$500,000. Chamber Position: Support. Although the Chamber supported this bill, the common construction wage law is an archaic relic from the Depression era and should be repealed. Died

SB 446 (Third Reading) Use of Public School Property by Charter Schools

Authored by Sen. Schneider. Establishes the process for leasing unused, closed or unoccupied public school buildings to charter schools. Chamber Position: Support. Taxpayers have already invested in these facilities with the expectation that they will be used for public educational purposes. School districts should not hold these unused facilities, often times with ongoing costs for maintenance and upkeep, when another public school institution is willing to use that facility for the purpose for which it was built and supported through taxpayer funds. Amended into HB 1002 and Signed by Governor

SB 459 (Third Reading) Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Conformity for Internet Sales

Authored by Sen. Kenley. Brings the state into compliance with the Streamlined Sale and Use Tax Agreement and promotes effort to collect Internet sales tax. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports conformance with the streamlined sales tax effort. Indiana's agreement to participate in this national program promotes sales tax law

uniformity and the voluntary collection of taxes by Internet retailers. Signed by Governor

SB 461 (Conference Committee Report) Health Care Reform Matters

Authored by Sen. Miller. Makes changes to Medicaid and insurance statutes to comply with the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA). **Chamber Position: Support.** This bill makes changes to existing law regarding Medicaid and insurance provisions in order to conform to the federal PPACA. **Signed by Governor**

SB 473 (Conference Committee Report) Public-Private Partnership (P3) Authorization

Authored by Sen. Wyss. Among other provisions, authorizes the governor to enter into public-private partnerships (P3s) for the purpose of building new or expanded roads and transportation infrastructure. Requires State Budget Committee review of any P3 agreements that include tolls while prohibiting tolls on I-69 and existing roadways without explicit authorization from the General Assembly. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports expanded P3 authority to bring much-needed private sector investment to the state's remaining infrastructure needs while spurring economic growth and job creation. **Signed by Governor**

SB 480 (Third Reading) Telecommunication Data and Deregulation

Authored by Sen. Hershman. Authorizes the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) to delegate authority to its staff to carry out certain duties and limits the information that communications service providers have to include in applications for certificates of territorial authority. Grants jurisdiction to resolve certain matters concerning video service franchises to the IURC rather than a court with jurisdiction. Chamber Position: Support. Furthers telecom reform and safeguards proprietary competitive information in a reasonable way, while promoting further investments in the state's telecommunications infrastructure. Signed by Governor

SB 482 (Third Reading) Adult Education

Authored by Sen. Kruse. Better aligns the Department of Education, State Board of Education, Department of Workforce Development and State Workforce Innovation Council to provide greater effectiveness in delivering adult education opportunities. **Chamber Position: Support.** Nearly one million Hoosier adults lack the basic skills that are needed for success in today's economy. This bill realigns the state's training programs to serve those adults more effectively. Many changes are consistent with the recommendations of a Chamber policy report and a 2009 bipartisan study committee. Amended into HB 1340 and **Signed by Governor**

SB 496 (Second Reading Amendment #1) Weakening Parental Petitions for School Reorganization Reforms

Authored by Sen. Skinner. Would have subjected school accountability to a vote of parents in the school and would

have excluded special education and English language learners from school accountability. **Chamber Position: Oppose.**Parent vote on accountability was intended to further delay or even completely undermine an accountability process that is already far too long (at least six consecutive years of failure). Exclusion of students would have resulted in those students being ignored and overlooked the focus on growth rather than static performance. **Amendment Failed**

SB 496 (Third Reading) Parental Petitions for School Reorganization

Authored by Sen. Kruse. Would have empowered parents of students in chronically failing schools to petition to reorganize the school. **Chamber Position: Support.** Indiana's accountability timeline allows schools to fail for at least six consecutive years before state officials can intervene. This policy would provide the parents of those schools several options for intervening sooner than the state timeline and to initiate school reform efforts on behalf of their children. **Died**

SB 497 (Third Reading) Early High School Graduation, Higher Education Scholarship

Authored by Sen. Kruse. Allows a high school senior to graduate after three years of high school and to use part of their state tuition support to begin college. Chamber Position: Support. The vast majority of Hoosier jobs now and in the future will require post-secondary education. This proposal would assist and incentivize students who are ready for college-level work to begin those pursuits. Amended into HB 1001 and Signed by Governor

SB 524 (Third Reading) Public Pensions Defined Contribution Plan

Authored by Sen. Walker. Establishes a defined contribution plan as an option for new state employees who elect not to become a member of the public employees' retirement fund (PERF). Urges the Legislative Council to assign to the Pension Management Oversight Commission the study of whether to create a defined contribution plan as an option for new employees participating in PERF or teachers' retirement fund (TRF). Chamber Position: Support. Alternatives for new employees to elect a defined contribution plan rather than the current PERF and TRF programs offer the potential for savings and should be considered and implemented to the extent deemed practical. Signed by Governor

SB 526 (Conference Committee Report) Marion County Government Reforms

Authored by Sen. Merritt. Would have eliminated advisory boards and transferred township budget oversight to the City-County Council in Marion County only. Would have unified Marion County poor relief standards and made other changes to follow along the lines of UniGov. Chamber Position: Support. Would have made progress in consolidating township functions in Marion County. Died

SB 550 (Third Reading)

Redevelopment Commissions and Authorities

Authored by Sen. Boots. Provided that the legislative body of a local government unit must approve the budget, the tax levy, spending, bond and debt financing, a lease pertaining to bonds or debt financing, payment of capitalized interest, selling of property, as well as allocation of excess tax revenue of the unit's redevelopment commission and redevelopment authority. Required the fiscal officers of the local government unit and the redevelopment commission or redevelopment authority to be the same. Chamber Position: Support. Gives additional oversight on major transactions for redevelopment commission and redevelopment authority. Died

SB 559 (Concurrence) Conflict of Interest

Authored by Sen. Bray. Specifies certain definitions and defenses that apply to the crime of conflict of interest. **Chamber Position: Support.** Clarifies the intent in the law and establishes reasonable and important conflict of interest language for public servants to abide by. **Signed by Governor**

SB 561 (Third Reading) Corrections and Sentencing

Authored by Sen. Steele. Required the Department of Correction to: (1) determine the average daily marginal cost of incarcerating an offender; (2) determine the average length of stay for a Class D felony offender in the department; and (3) administer an incentive and disincentive program for counties to reduce the number of Class D felony offenders committed to the department. Provided other changes to probation sentencing administration. **Chamber Position: Support.** Encompasses the reform measures that better balance punishment with the crime and available resources, as recommended by a bipartisan commission. **Died**

SB 575 (Concurrence)

Limits on Teacher Union Collective Bargaining

Authored by Sen. Boots. Limits teacher union collective bargaining agreements to wages and benefits. **Chamber Position: Support.** Scales back a range of union practices that prevent schools from operating effectively and efficiently. **Signed by Governor**

SB 576 (Conference Committee Report) Worker's Compensation Administration

Authored by Sen. Boots. Requires all members of the Worker's Compensation Board be attorneys in good standing admitted to practice law in Indiana. Requires a health care provider to file a claim for payment with the board not later than one year after the last date the provider provided services to an injured employee. Requires the board to establish a schedule of fees and charges for the resolution of health care provider claims. Makes numerous other changes. Chamber Position: Support. Most of the changes would enable the board to operate in a more efficient manner. The time limits for filing claims will hopefully lead to quicker resolution of claims. Signed by Governor

SB 584 (Third Reading) Local Indiana Business Preference

Authored by Sen. Paul. Provided a price preference to local Indiana businesses bidding on purchasing and public works contracts awarded by political subdivisions. Chamber Position: Support. The Indiana Chamber supports reasonable efforts to have state government make purchases from Indiana-based vendors while providing value and good stewardship of tax dollars to Hoosier taxpayers. The preferences in this bill were well-structured and similar to those used by other jurisdictions. Died

SB 589 (Third Reading) Corporate Income Tax Rate Reduction

Authored by Sen. Hershman. Reduces the corporate income tax rate from 8.5% to 6.5%. **Chamber Position: Support.** This is an important effort to make Indiana even more competitive by bringing its corporate rate more in line with other states. Amended into HB 1004 and **Signed by Governor**

SB 590 (Third Reading) Illegal Immigration Matters

Authored by Sen. Delph. Makes state and local law enforcement responsible for determing the legal status of immigrants. Generally requires only English be used in public meetings and in public documents. Disallows certain income tax credits and deductions for employers hiring undocumented workers unless they used the E-Verify program. Chamber Position: Oppose. People coming into this country to work should do so legally. However, this attempt is simply not good public policy. An Arizona-style immigration law will not put Indiana in the best light and could have severe financial consequences for the state's economic development efforts – both with the relocation and expansion of businesses. Signed by Governor

HB 1001 (Second Reading Amendment #59) Expansion of Teacher Union Collective Bargaining

Authored by Sen. Tallian. Would have allowed collective bargaining for teachers to be extended to subjects beyond wages and wage-related benefits. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have reversed the core components of HB 575. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1001 (Second Reading Amendment #65) Expansion of Teacher Union Collective Bargaining

Authored by Sen. Tallian Would have subjected hours of school operation to collective bargaining. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The past inclusion of hours in collective bargaining has been used as a detrimental tool for keeping school leaders from managing their schools effectively and efficiently. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1001 (Conference Committee Report) State Budget

Sponsored by Sen. Kenley. Establishes the state appropriations and expenditure authorizations for the next two years (2012-13 biennium). **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports the fiscal prudence evidenced by this budget that

essentially flatlines most appropriations to match fiscal year 2011 spending and makes additional reductions where feasible. This budget demonstrates a commitment to eliminating the structural deficit without increasing taxes. Signed by Governor

HB 1002 (Second Reading Amendment #3) Charter School Authorizer Restrictions

Authored by Sen. Lanane. Would have eliminated private colleges as potential authorizers. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Multiple authorizers assure greater opportunities for the formation of new charter schools. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1002 (Second Reading Amendment #4) Virtual Charter School Enrollment Limitations

Authored by Sen. Lanane. Would have limited virtual charter school enrollment to just 1,000 students statewide. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Parent options should not be limited to artificial caps that in no way reflect the demands of parents or the capacity to serve students. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1002 (Third Reading) Charter Schools Expansion

Sponsored by Sen. Kruse. Expands the number of authorizers of charter schools, removes limits imposed on current authorizers, expands funding for virtual charter schools and creates accountability mechanisms for authorizers. Chamber Position: Support. Will strengthen Indiana's charter school law and help create more options for parents. Signed by Governor

HB 1003 (Third Reading) School Choice Scholarships

Sponsored by Sen. Kruse. Provides scholarships to low- and middle-income students to help pay the cost of tuition and fees at a public or private school of their choice that charges tuition. **Chamber Position: Support.** Creates more options for parents to select the schools that best fit the unique needs of their individual children. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1004 (Conference Committee Report) Corporate Income Tax Rate Reduction

Sponsored by Sen. Hershman. Makes a wide variety and large volume of changes, both substantive and procedural, affecting state and local tax matters. Included was the reduction of the corporate income tax rate from 8.5% to 6.5% over four years. (The bill incorporated the provisions of many other tax-related bills that had been considered throughout the session.) Chamber Position: Support. Will make Indiana even more competitive by bringing its corporate rate more in line with other states, serving to promote capital investment and economic development. Signed by Governor

HB 1005 (Conference Committee Report) Expansion of the Industrial Recovery Tax Credit

Sponsored by Sen. Charbonneau. Expands the applicability of the industrial recovery income tax credit. **Chamber Position: Support.** Will increase the number of property redevelopments. Restoring unused and underutilized

industrial sites – regardless of the period of vacancy, degree of vacancy or size of facility – serves to expand the tax rolls and promotes economic growth in the community. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1006 (Third Reading) Streamlined Regulatory Filings and Entrepreneurship

Sponsored by Sen. Hershman. Requires various state agencies to coordinate in the promotion of entrepreneurship, including a new state web site that serves as a one-stop shop to obtain and file all necessary registration, permits and licenses for a new start-up business. Requires inter-agency coordination on economic development and entrepreneurship education. Chamber Position: Support. Streamlines regulatory filing requirements for business start-ups and takes reasonable steps to promote entrepreneurship in the state. Signed by Governor

HB 1007 (Conference Committee Report) Economic Development Tax Incentives

Sponsored by Sen. Hershman. Provides a number of new local incentives and economic development tools. Chamber Position: Support. This provides local units with several new tools to promote economic development. The taxation of personal property is a detriment to economic development and an impediment to capital investment. Providing local units with the option to provide enhanced and alternative abatement of property will improve their ability to entice new investment to their communities. Signed by Governor

HB 1015 (Conference Committee Report) Long-Term Care Insurance Commissions

Sponsored by Sen. Paul. Addresses financial requirements that apply to limited purpose subsidiary life insurance companies. Specifies qualifications and educational requirements for solicitation negotiation, and sale of annuities. Makes changes to limitations on long-term care insurance commission amounts. Chamber Position: Support. Removal of the commission limitation could encourage more sales of long-term care products. Selling more long-term care policies means that fewer individuals would be relying on Medicaid. Signed by Governor

HB 1022 (Third Reading) Township Government Nepotism and Conflicts of Interest

Sponsored by Sen. C. Lawson. Prohibited nepotism and conflict of interest for a county, city or town officeholder/candidate; notable exemptions. **Chamber Position: Support.** Would have reduced local government nepotism and potential conflict of interest with an employee of a unit of local government from serving on its legislative or fiscal body. **Died**

HB 1024 (Third Reading) Notice of Foreclosure to Insurers; Auto Insurance

Sponsored by Sen. Holdman. Requires an insurer to provide a written notice of policy cancellation to the named insured at least 20 days before canceling a policy covering residential property if the insurer has received a copy of the complaint

filed in the foreclosure action concerning the insured property. Exempts commercial auto policies for non-owned coverage from requiring uninsured and under-insured motorist coverage. **Chamber Position: Support.** When businesses purchase a commercial policy and select hired non-owned auto coverage, they do not expect to be covering uninsured motorist/underinsured motorist coverage for employees' use of their own personal vehicles. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1046 (Third Reading)

Property Tax Deduction for Builders of New, Unsold Residences

Sponsored by Sen. Hershman. Provides a 50% property tax deduction to a residential builder for a single family residence, townhouse or condominium that has never been occupied as a principal residence. The deduction terminates when title to the structure is transferred to the homeowner. **Chamber Position: Support.** Recovery of the housing market is of great importance to the recovery of our overall economy. Residential builders were among those hardest hit. This bill helps this industry through these tough times by temporarily relieving them from paying taxes on their built but unsold inventory. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1074 (Third Reading) School Board Elections Moved to the Fall

Sponsored by C. Lawson. Moves school board elections from the primary election to the general election. Chamber Position: Support. School boards play critical roles in setting local tax rates and in their oversight of local public schools. Yet, most school board members are elected during primary elections in the spring when voter turnout is typically at its lowest. Moving all school board elections to the fall as part of general elections will help increase voter participation and involvement of the public in the oversight of local public schools. Signed by Governor

HB 1112 (Third Reading)

Allowing Land Application of Industrial Waste Products

Sponsored by Sen. Gard. Permits the application of an industrial waste as a soil additive or fertilizer. Chamber Position: Support. The Chamber supports the use of byproducts in applications where it is economically prudent and does not present an unreasonable risk to public health or the environment. Signed by Governor

HB 1128 (Conference Committee Report) Expansion of Renewable Energy Resources

Sponsored by Sen. Gard. Adds hydrogen and coal bed methane to the list of renewables. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports alternative energy sources that provide additional sources of energy while not presenting an unreasonable risk to our environment. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1129 (Conference Committee Report) Prohibiting Text Messaging While Driving

Sponsored by Sen. Holdman. A reasonable proposal to deter the dangerous activity of texting while driving. **Chamber Position: Support.** Texting while operating a motor vehicle is a dangerous activity. The penalties are reasonable, are limited

to texting only and do not interfere with intrastate or interstate commerce. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1131 (Third Reading)

Study of Video Service Franchise Fees and Deregulation

Sponsored by Sen. Merritt. Directs the Regulatory Flexibility Committee to study and report findings on the anti-competitive effects of legacy local government unit video service franchise fees on the provision of video service in Indiana, as well as the appropriateness of these fees. **Chamber Position: Support.** This study will lead to further deregulation of telecommunications services in Indiana and eliminate anti-competitive barriers. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1183 (Third Reading) Indiana Business Price Preferences in State Purchases

Sponsored by Sen. Charbonneau. Provides an additional preference for purchases made by a state agency for supplies manufactured, assembled or produced by an Indiana business in Indiana. Provides a price preference for agriculture products grown or produced in Indiana. Chamber Position: Support. This bill is a reasonable effort to promote the procurement of Indiana-produced goods and services by Indiana government. Signed by Governor

HB 1187 (Third Reading) Satellite Manure Storage Facilities

Sponsored by Sen. Gard. Regulates manure storage facilities over a certain size. **Chamber Position: Support.** Confined feeding facilities are an important part of the Indiana business community. The Chamber supports giving the state the authority to permit previously unregulated manure facilities that provide environmental protection and management. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1200 (Third Reading) Immunity for Brownfield Activities

Sponsored by Sen. Eckerty. Allows a property owner of one acre or less to pave or plant vegetation without incurring any additional environmental liability. **Chamber Position: Support.** Promotes the cleanup of additional contaminated sites, which would return the sites to the tax rolls and employee Hoosiers. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1203 (Third Reading) Right to Secret Ballot in Union Elections

Sponsored by Sen. M. Young. Provides the right to vote by secret ballot in union organizing elections. Chamber Position:
Support. The right to vote by secret ballot is one of our country's most fundamental rights and should be preserved for all elections. Employees shouldn't face intimidation or coercion in voting for union organizing. Signed by Governor

HB 1216 (Third Reading) Common Construction Wage and Project Labor Agreements

Sponsored by Sen. Walker. Increases threshold that triggers a common construction wage hearing on public construction projects. Authorizes study committee on prohibiting union-

only project labor agreements on public construction projects. **Chamber Position: Support.** Public construction projects should be open for competitive bidding, not subject to union-only labor agreements. The changes in the common construction wage statute for public projects will help produce taxpayer savings. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1221 (Third Reading) Life Insurance and Medicaid

Sponsored by Sen. Kenley. Allows the state to use federal or state Medicaid funds to pay life insurance premiums and expenses for a Medicaid applicant or recipient who has irrevocably named the state as the beneficiary of a life insurance policy or assigned a life insurance policy to the state. Chamber Position: Support. The Chamber supports measures that could potentially reduce Medicaid expenditures. If the state is beneficiary to a life insurance policy, this could be an opportunity to recoup additional Medicaid expenditures. Signed by Governor

HB 1233 (Conference Committee Report) Insurance and Worker's Compensation Study Committee

Sponsored by Sen. Miller. Creates the Insurance Interim Study Committee to examine insurance issues and worker's compensation. Chamber Position: Support. A standing interim insurance committee could study issues that have a financial impact on employers, as examples: worker's comp., billing under arrangement and health insurance network issues. Signed by Governor

HB 1251 (Third Reading) Young Entrepreneur Program

Sponsored by Sen. M. Young. Requires the Indiana Economic Development Corporation to establish a young entrepreneurs program to promote the business proposals of students in entrepreneurial programs at state educational institutions. Provides that the program include an auction process for communities to bid for the opportunity to locate a young entrepreneur's start-up business in their community. Chamber Position: Support. This bill is an innovative proposal to spur economic growth and build Hoosiers' entrepreneurial skills while leveraging taxpayer investments in higher education. Signed by Governor

HB 1260 (Third Reading) School Corporation Health Insurance

Sponsored by Sen. Charbonneau. Specifies certain requirements and recommendations for school corporation employee health coverage programs. Attempts to get public school health insurance plan costs more under control, including eventually switching coverage to the state plan. Chamber Position:

Support. Creates limits on the "richness" of school health care plans – the cost of which are exploding annually. Potentially lessens financial costs to the state. Signed by Governor

HB 1267 (Third Reading) Drug Testing and Unemployment Benefits

Sponsored by Sen. Leising. Provides that an individual who is required to undergo drug testing as a condition of an offer of employment and who files an initial claim for unemployment

benefits must be advised that the individual is disqualified for benefits if the person is found to have a positive drug test or refuses to submit to a drug test. **Chamber Position:**Support. Persons abusing drugs should not be permitted to collect unemployment benefits. Amended into SB 86 and Signed by Governor

HB 1275 (Third Reading) Using Economic Development Tax Funds for Other Purposes

Sponsored by Sen. C. Lawson. Authorizes a county, city or town to transfer money from its economic development income tax fund or rainy day fund to its general fund or any fund or account of the county, city or town. Chamber Position: Oppose. There is no justification for making it easier to transfer monies that are collected under the guise of promoting economic development to be transferred to other funds for unrelated purposes. Signed by Governor

HB 1325 (Conference Committee Report) Identification Requirements for Alcohol Purchases

Sponsored by Sen. Merritt. Alters the identification requirement to someone "who is or reasonably appears to be less than 40 years of age" before a purchase is made. Chamber Position: Support. HB 1340 (Third Reading) Realignment of Adult Education Administration

Sponsored by Sen. Kruse. Better aligns the Department of Education, State Board of Education, Department of Workforce Development and State Workforce Innovation Council to provide greater effectiveness in delivering adult education opportunities. Chamber Position: Support. Nearly one million Hoosier adults lack the basic skills that are needed for success in today's economy. This bill realigns the state's training programs to serve those adults more effectively. Many changes are consistent with the recommendations of a Chamber policy report and a 2009 bipartisan study committee. Signed by Governor

HB 1341 (Third Reading) Special Education Grants for Private Schools

Sponsored by Sen. Yoder. Requires public school districts to expend proportionate shares of their state special education grants on students in nonpublic schools whose needs generated the state funds. Chamber Position: Support. Special needs students who enroll in private schools are counted in the special needs enrollment counts for their local public schools and generate the same funding levels as other special needs students in the district. Federal law requires that the funding generated by private school students must be spent on private school students, but current state law does not. Requiring these funds to be spent on the students who generated them will provide parents with more options,

assure that privately placed special needs students are better served and provide better opportunities for special needs students to be enrolled in private schools. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1369 (Third Reading)

Pay for Performance Program for School Administrators

Sponsored by Sen. Kruse. Would have created the high school graduation study committee, limited superintendent severance packages, established performance standards for school administrators, provided flexibility from superintendent licensing and required a study of superintendent compensation packages. Chamber Position: Support. Addressed several issues pertaining to school administrator performance. Died.

HB 1369 (Conference Committee Report) Pay for Performance Program for School Administrators

Sponsored by Sen. Kruse. Would have provided school districts with greater flexibility in the hiring of their school leaders and would have required schools to implement performance pay for school administrators. **Chamber Position: Support.** As the state considers performance pay for teachers, consistency demands similar incentives for school leaders. Additionally, given that superintendent jobs require knowledge and skills that go well beyond teaching, school boards should have the option to hire district leaders from a broader set of applicants. **Died**

HB 1429 (Third Reading)

Deregulation of Textbooks and Other Curricular Material

Sponsored by Sen. Kruse. Expands definition of "textbook" to include certain hardware, software and digital content. Adds a definition of "curricular materials" and requires the Department of Education to review them. Requires governing body of each school corporation to adopt textbooks for the school corporation. Chamber Position: Support. Provides flexibility for schools to use the best curriculum materials available and eliminates bureaucratic oversight by the state. Signed by Governor

HB 1450 (Third Reading)

Reduction of Unemployment Insurance Tax Increases

Sponsored by Sen. Hershman. Mitigates effects of unemployment tax increase on all employers by placing

them in Schedule E (a much lower rate scale) through 2020. Reduces benefits to the long-term jobless to incentivize them to truly seek and then accept employment. **Chamber Position: Support.** As of January 13, 2011, Indiana had borrowed almost \$2 billion from the federal unemployment trust fund in order to pay benefits to unemployed Hoosiers. Indiana needs to start paying off this loan and the associated interest. This bill addresses some of the eligibility and benefit issues. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1451 (Third Reading) Mint Distilling Operations Study

Sponsored by Sen. Charbonneau. Requires the Environmental Quality Service Council to study air emissions of mint distilling operations and report findings and recommendations to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management. Chamber Position: Support. Indiana is the third largest state in the production of mint. This measure creates a level of protection from unnecessary regulation while a summer study committee reviews, studies and makes recommendations related to the air emissions of the mint distilling operations. Signed by Governor

HB 1486 (Third Reading) Insurance Administration Matters

Sponsored by Sen. Paul. Makes various changes concerning insurance law and administration, including financial audits and reporting, licensing, HMOs and small employer health insurance plans. Chamber Position: Support. Contains important updates to insurance rules and administration sought by the Department of Insurance. Much of this language brings Indiana law into sync with the National Association of Insurance Commission standards. Signed by Governor

HB 1538 (Third Reading) Limiting Living Wage Rules

Sponsored by Sen. Schneider. Prohibits a local unit of government from setting a minimum wage that exceeds the state or federal minimum wage. Chamber Position:

Support. Existing state and federal minimum wage levels should continue to be utilized; local wage laws in excess of those levels would result in job losses. Signed by Governor

HB 1002 (Second Reading Amendment #48) Charter School Transportation Funding

Authored by Rep. Kersey. Would have eliminated a new provision to provide transportation funding for charter schools. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Proportionate share of transportation funding would have allowed charter schools greater funding parity in comparison to traditional public schools. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1002 (Second Reading Amendment #39) School Board Approval of Charter Schools

Authored by Rep. V. Smith. Would have required that charter school proposals be submitted first to local school boards. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** School boards have shown little willingness to allow new charter schools to be formed; this amendment was simply a proposal for stifling charter school growth. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1002 (Second Reading Amendment #51) Charter School Budgets

Authored by Rep. VanDenburgh. Would have required that charter school budgets be approved by local legislative bodies. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** A primary strength of charter schools is their operational autonomy, but this amendment would have added an unprecedented approval process that exists in no other state. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1002 (Second Reading Amendment #49) Charter School Authorizers

Authored by Rep. Porter. Would have required all charter schools to be approved by the State Board of Education. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The existence of multiple authorizers is critical to the viability of a state's charter school environment; and this proposal would have effectively eliminated the roles of all but one statewide authorizer. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1002 (Concurrence) Charter School Expansion

Authored by Speaker Bosma. Expands the number of authorizers of charter schools, removes limits imposed on current authorizers, expands funding for virtual charter schools and creates accountability mechanisms for authorizers. Chamber Position: Support. Will strengthen Indiana's charter school law and help create more options for parents. Signed by Governor

HB 1003 (Second Reading Amendment #46) School Choice Scholarships

Authored by Rep. Behning. Makes students receiving scholarship tax credits eligible for vouchers in subsequent years. Chamber Position: Support. Without this provision, students attending kindergarten and first grade in private schools would be ineligible for the voucher in future years. Also relieves pressure from the scholarship tax credit, which has the lowest contribution limits of all similar programs in the country. Amendment Prevailed

HB 1003 (Second Reading Amendment #25) School Choice Scholarships Limitations

Authored by Rep. DeLaney. Would have limited voucher participation to only students from failing schools. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The intent of this bill is to allow parents to find the best schools for their children, with some children in non-failing schools also needing options. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1003 (Second Reading Amendment #41) School Choice Scholarships Limitations

Authored by Rep. Cheatham. Would have limited voucher participation to only students who have failed ISTEP. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Failure should not be a prerequisite for parents to choose the best school settings for their children. Options should help avoid failure, not be dependent upon failure. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1003 (Second Reading Amendment #8) School Choice Scholarships Limitations

Authored by Rep. VanDenburgh. Would have limited voucher participation to students who qualify for free/reduced lunch. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have eliminated thousands of families with moderate incomes, who also need options. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1003 (Second Reading Amendment #13) School Choice Scholarships Referenda

Authored by Rep. Battles. Would have required a public referendum to implement school choice. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The General Assembly does not submit any of its other policy decisions to public referendum, and neither should this policy be determined through that process. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1003 (Second Reading Amendment #40) School Choice Scholarships Limitations

Authored by Rep. Kersey. Would have allowed parents of voucher students to withdraw from "objectionable" courses. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Amendment would have allowed

students to withdraw from English, math or any other subject if the parents so determined. **Amendment Failed**

HB 1003 (Concurrence) School Choice Scholarships

Authored by Rep. Behning. Provides scholarships to lowand middle-income students to help pay the cost of tuition and fees at a public or private school that charges tuition. **Chamber Position: Support**. Creates more options for parents to select the schools that best fit the unique needs of their individual children. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1004 (Third Reading) Access to State Financial Data

Authored by Rep. Turner. Requires the state auditor and the Office of Management and Budget to work with the Office of Technology to establish a web site with a database of state expenditures and fund balances. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports the ongoing efforts to build and expand a web portal that allows taxpayers to see where their dollars are being spent. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1004 (Conference Committee Report) Corporate Income Tax Rate Reduction

Authored by Rep. Turner. Reduction of the corporate income tax rate from 8.5% to 6.5% over four years. (The bill incorporated the provisions of many other tax-related bills that had been considered throughout the session.) **Chamber Position: Support.** Will make Indiana even more competitive by bringing its corporate rate more in line with other states, serving to promote capital investment and economic development. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1005 (Conference Committee Report) Expansion of the Industrial Recovery Tax Credit

Authored by Rep. Clere. Expands the applicability of the industrial recovery income tax credit. **Chamber Position: Support.** Will increase the number of property redevelopments. Restoring unused and underutilized industrial sites serves to expand the tax rolls and promotes economic growth in the community. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1006 (Third Reading) Streamlined Regulatory Filings and Entrepreneurship

Authored by Rep. Crouch. Requires various state agencies to coordinate in the promotion of entrepreneurship, including a new state web site that serves as a one-stop shop to obtain and file all necessary registration, permits and licenses for a new start-up business. Requires inter-agency coordination on economic development and entrepreneurship education. Chamber Position: Support. Streamlines regulatory filing requirements for business start-ups and takes reasonable steps to promote entrepreneurship. Signed by Governor

HB 1007 (Conference Committee Report) Economic Development Tax Incentives

Authored by Rep. Messmer. Provides a number of new local incentives and economic development tools. **Chamber Position: Support.** The taxation of personal property is a

detriment to economic development and an impediment to capital investment. Providing local units with the option to provide enhanced and alternative assessment of property will improve their ability to entice new investment to their communities. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1008 (Third Reading) Expansion of Venture Capital Investment Credit

Authored by Rep. Torr. Expands credit from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 for qualified Indiana businesses after December 31, 2011. **Chamber Position: Support.** Making venture capital more available to promising start-ups is an essential element in nurturing new business development. The credit has been key to growing the high tech and biotech industries in Indiana. Making it more broadly and readily available can only be viewed as a plus for Indiana's economy. Amended into HB 1004 and **Signed by Governor**

HB 1015 (Conference Committee Report) Long-Term Care Insurance Commissions

Authored by Rep. Torr. Addresses financial requirements that apply to limited purpose subsidiary life insurance companies. Specifies qualifications and educational requirements for solicitation, negotiation and sale of annuities. Makes changes to limitations on long-term care insurance commission amounts. Chamber Position: Support. Removal of the commission limitation could encourage more sales of long-term care products, resulting in fewer individuals relying on Medicaid. Signed by Governor

HB 1018 (Third Reading) Smoking Ban in Public Places

Authored by Rep. C. Brown. Would have prohibited smoking in the vast majority of public places, exempting bars/taverns, casinos, nursing homes and fraternal clubs. **Chamber Position: Support.** Smoking has a significant, negative financial impact on businesses providing employee health benefits and other work-related costs. **Died**

HB 1022 (Conference Committee Report) Prohibiting Township Government Nepotism and Conflicts of Interest

Authored by Rep. Saunders. Would have prohibited nepotism and conflict of interest for a county, city or town officeholder/candidate; notable exemptions. **Chamber Position: Support.** Would have reduced local government nepotism and potential conflict of interest with an employee of a unit of local government barred from serving on its legislative or fiscal body. **Died**

HB 1024 (Concurrence) Notice of Foreclosure to Insurers; Auto Insurance

Authored by Rep. Lehman. Requires an insurer to provide a written notice of policy cancellation to the named insured at least 20 days before canceling a policy covering residential property if the insurer has received a copy of the complaint filed in the foreclosure action concerning the insured property. Exempts commercial auto policies for non-owned coverage from requiring uninsured and under-insured motorist coverage. **Chamber Position: Support.** When businesses

purchase a commercial policy and select hired non-owned auto coverage, they do not expect to be covering uninsured motorist/underinsured motorist coverage for employees' use of their own personal vehicles. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1046 (Concurrence)

Property Tax Deduction for New, Unsold Residences

Authored by Rep. Crouch. Provides a 50% property tax deduction to a residential builder for a single family residence, townhouse or condominium that has never been occupied as a principal residence. **Chamber Position: Support.** Recovery of the housing market is of great importance to the recovery of our overall economy. Residential builders were among those hardest hit. This helps this industry by temporarily relieving them from paying taxes on their built but unsold inventory. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1074 (Concurrence)

School Board Elections Moved to General Election

Authored by Rep. Frizzell. Moves school board elections from the primary election to the general election. **Chamber Position: Support.** School boards play critical roles in setting local tax rates and in their oversight of local public schools. Yet, most school board members are elected during primary elections when voter turnout is typically at its lowest. Moving all school board elections to the fall as part of general elections will help increase voter participation and oversight of local public schools. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1112 (Concurrence)

Allowing Land Application of Industrial Waste Products

Authored by Rep. Pond. Permits the application of an industrial waste as a soil additive or fertilizer. **Chamber Position: Support.** The use of byproducts in applications where it is economically prudent does not present an unreasonable risk to public health or the environment. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1128 (Conference Committee Report) Expansion of Renewable Energy Resources

Authored by Rep. Koch. Adds hydrogen and coal bed methane to the list of renewables. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports alternative energy sources that provide additional sources of energy while not presenting an unreasonable risk to our environment. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1129 (Conference Committee Report) Prohibiting Text Messaging While Driving

Authored by Rep. Koch. A reasonable proposal to deter the dangerous activity of texting while driving. **Chamber Position: Support.** Texting while operating a motor vehicle is a dangerous activity. The penalties are reasonable (an infraction), are limited to texting only and do not interfere with intrastate or interstate commerce. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1130 (Third Reading) Opportunities to Correct Regulatory Violations

Authored by Rep. Koch. Would have imposed a duty on a state agency under certain circumstances to give an entity an opportunity to correct an alleged violation of law that is

discovered in an inspection. **Chamber Position: Support.** Promotes a positive relationship between the regulatory agencies and Indiana business and industry, and promotes the "assistance before enforcement" philosophy. **Died**

HB 1131 (Third Reading)

Study of Video Service Franchise Fees and Deregulation

Authored by Rep. Koch. Directs the Regulatory Flexibility Committee to study and report findings on the anti-competitive effects of legacy local government unit video service franchise fees on the provision of video service in Indiana, as well as the appropriateness of these fees. **Chamber Position: Support.** This study may lead to further deregulation of telecommunications services in Indiana and eliminate anti-competitive barriers. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1170 (Third Reading) Restricting Public Safety Local Option Income Tax to Public Safety

Authored by Rep. Morris. Provided that a county or municipality that receives revenue from a local option income tax (LOIT) for public safety must use those funds only for public safety purposes. Public safety LOIT may not be used to reduce or replace revenue devoted to public safety purposes from any other source of revenue. Chamber Position: Support. This bill ensures that if a public safety LOIT is used, that it should be used for public safety only. Died

HB 1183 (Third Reading)

Indiana Business Price Preferences in State Purchases

Authored by Rep. Dermody. Provides an additional preference for purchases made by a state agency for supplies manufactured, assembled or produced by an Indiana business in Indiana. Provides a price preference for agriculture products grown or produced in Indiana. Chamber Position: Support. This bill is a reasonable effort to promote the procurement of Indiana-produced goods and services by Indiana government. Signed by Governor

HB 1187 (Concurrence) Satellite Manure Storage Facilities

Authored by Rep. Davis. Regulates manure storage facilities over a certain size (these storage facilities were not previously regulated). **Chamber Position: Support.** Confined feeding facilities are an important part of the Indiana business community. The Chamber supports giving the state the authority to permit previously unregulated manure facilities that provide a level of environmental protection and management. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1200 (Third Reading) Immunity for Brownfield Activities

Authored by Rep. Davis. Allows a property owner of one acre or less to pave or plant vegetation without incurring any additional environmental liability. **Chamber Position: Support.** Promotes the cleanup of additional contaminated sites, which would return the sites to the tax rolls and employee Hoosiers. **Signed by Governor**

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Authored by Rep. Ubelhor. Provides the right to vote by secret ballot in union organizing elections. **Chamber Position: Support.** The right to vote by secret ballot is one of our country's most fundamental rights and should be preserved for all elections. Employees shouldn't face intimidation or coercion in voting for union organizing. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1216 (Third Reading) Common Construction Wage and Project Labor Agreements

Authored by Rep. Davis. Increases threshold that triggers a common construction wage hearing on public construction projects. Authorizes a study committee on union-only project labor agreements. Chamber Position: Support. Public construction projects should be open for competitive bidding, not subject to union-only labor agreements. The changes in the common construction wage statute for public projects will produce taxpayer savings. Signed by Governor

HB 1221 (Concurrence) Life Insurance and Medicaid

Authored by Rep. T. Brown. Allows the state to use federal or state Medicaid funds to pay life insurance premiums and expenses for a Medicaid applicant or recipient who has irrevocably named the state as the beneficiary of a life insurance policy or assigned a life insurance policy to the state. **Chamber Position: Support.** If the state is beneficiary to a life insurance policy, this could be an opportunity to recoup additional Medicaid expenditures. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1233 (Conference Committee Report) Insurance and Worker's Compensation Study Committee

Authored by Rep. Wolkins. Creates the Insurance Interim Study Committee to examine insurance issues and worker's compensation. Chamber Position: Support. A standing interim insurance committee could study issues that have a financial impact on employers, as examples: worker's comp., billing under arrangement and health insurance network issues. HB 1251 (Third Reading) Young Entrepreneur Program

Authored by Rep. Ellspermann. Authored by Rep. Kubacki. Provides that an individual who is required to undergo drug testing as a condition of an offer of employment and who files an initial claim for unemployment benefits must be advised that the individual is disqualified for benefits if the person is found to have a positive drug test or refuses to submit to a drug test. **Chamber Position: Support.** Persons abusing drugs should not be permitted to collect unemployment benefits. Authored by Rep. Saunders. HB 1325 (Conference Committee Report) Identification Requirements for Alcohol Purchases

Authored by Rep. Steuerwald. Alters the identification requirement at liquor stores to someone "who is or reasonably appears to be less than 40 years of age" before a purchase is made. Chamber Position: Support. Indiana's onerous law requiring persons and businesses selling alcoholic beverages to seek identification/proof of age from all purchasers should be repealed. Employee training, use of common sense and good faith efforts to seek identification are sufficient. The current (and recently enacted) law has proven unworkable and unpopular. Signed by Governor

HB 1369 (Conference Committee Report) Pay for Performance Program for School Administrators

Authored by Rep. Soliday. This bill avoids the harsh treatment disallowing amendments after only six months. (Nearly every other tax allows amendments for a period of years rather than just six months.) Amended into HB 1004 and Signed by Governor

HB 1450 (Third Reading) Reduction of Unemployment Insurance Tax Increases

Authored by Rep. Leonard. Mitigates effects of unemployment tax increase on all employers by placing them in Schedule E (a much lower rate scale) through 2020. Reduces benefits to the long-term jobless to incentivize them to truly seek and then accept employment. Chamber Position: Support. As of January 13, 2011, Indiana had borrowed almost \$2 billion from the federal unemployment trust fund in order to pay benefits to unemployed Hoosiers. Indiana needs to start paying off this loan and the associated interest. This bill addresses some of the eligibility and benefit issues. Signed by Governor

HB 1451 (Third Reading) Mint Distilling Operations Study

Authored by Rep. Dermody. Requires the Environmental Quality Service Council to study air emissions of mint distilling operations and report findings and recommendations to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management. **Chamber Position: Support.** Indiana is the third largest state in the production of mint. This measure creates a level of protection from unnecessary regulation while a summer study committee reviews, studies and makes recommendations related to the air emissions of the mint distilling operations. **Signed by Governor**

HB 1457 (Third Reading) Clean Energy Improvement Financing District

Authored by Rep. Neese. Would have required the Environmental Quality Service Council to study clean energy improvement financing districts. Requires the council to study and make recommendations concerning subordination of interests of lienholders. Chamber Position: Support. Promotes energy conservation as a method to decrease our energy demand and promotes cost savings for Indiana businesses and industries. Died

HB 1486 (Third Reading) Insurance Administration Matters

Authored by Rep. Lehman. Makes various changes concerning insurance law and administration, including financial audits and reporting, licensing, HMOs and small employer health insurance plans. Chamber Position: Support. Important updates to insurance rules and administration sought by the Department of Insurance. Much of this language brings Indiana law into sync with the National Association of Insurance Commission standards. Signed by Governor

HB 1538 (Third Reading) Limiting Living Wage Rules

Authored by Rep. Speedy. Prohibits a local unit of government from setting a minimum wage that exceeds the state or federal minimum wage. **Chamber Position: Support.** Existing state

and federal minimum wage levels should continue to be utilized; local wage laws in excess of those levels would result in job losses. **Signed by Governor**

SB 1 (Second Reading Amendment #27) Teacher Performance Evaluations

Authored by Rep. Sullivan. Would have required 75% of teachers to approve the school district's teacher evaluation plan for it to be approved. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have required a super-majority to approve a teacher evaluation plan. Teachers and their union would have gained a virtual veto on their own performance evaluation plans. **Amendment prevailed but was removed later in the session.**

SB 1 (Second Reading Amendment #29) Teacher Performance and Testing

Authored by Rep. V. Smith. Would have required psychometric evaluation of ISTEP for use in the evaluation of teachers. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Amendment attempted to perpetuate current ban on consideration of student test scores by requiring a vague affirmation process that such use is appropriate. **Amendment Failed**

SB 1 (Second Reading Amendment #35) Teacher Performance

Authored by Rep. Kersey. Would have required teacher evaluation processes to be included in collective bargaining. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have countered efforts in SB 575 to limit collective bargaining to wage and wage-related benefits only. **Amendment Failed**

SB 1 (Second Reading Amendment #14) Teacher Performance

Authored by Rep. Austin. Would have reinstated schools of education as the only potential sources for teacher licensing. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have reversed recently passed rules adopted by the Indiana Professional Standards Board that eliminated the monopoly on the teaching field that had been established by schools of education. **Amendment Failed**

SB 1 (Second Reading Amendment #8) Teacher Performance

Authored by Rep. Porter. Would have excluded the performance of special education students and English language learners from being considered in teacher evaluations. Chamber Position: Oppose. Many of the students that would have been excluded are capable of learning but would have been ignored as a result of their exclusion. Moreover, the plans being implemented for teacher evaluations consider growth, not raw performance, and will take into account the learning challenges related to these sizeable groups. Amendment Failed

SB 1 (Third Reading)

Teacher Performance-Based Evaluations and Pay

Sponsored by Rep. Behning. Provides for performance-based pay. Restructures teacher evaluation processes to include measures of student performance. Eliminates layoff procedures and salary schedules based entirely on seniority. Creates teacher evaluation categories with consequences. **Chamber**

Position: Support. Improves the evaluation process and accountability provisions for teachers. Signed by Governor

SB 26 (Third Reading)

Local Government Reorganization and Merger

Sponsored by Rep. Truitt. Allows a political subdivision to retain a part of its levy and budget that would otherwise be reduced because of savings from a government reorganization or township merger. Chamber Position: Support. Allows local units of government to defray one-time transition costs from a possible merger that would come from the projected savings from the current levy. It enhances the potential for other local government mergers. Signed by Governor

SB 32 (Third Reading) Vote Center Option for All Counties

Sponsored by Rep. Truitt. Establishes the use of vote centers as an option for all counties. **Chamber Position: Support.** Vote centers have been tested in several Indiana counties for several years with great success. They enhance convenience for voters and reduce the cost of elections. **Signed by Governor**

SB 47 (Third Reading) Various Riverboat Matters

Sponsored by Rep. Davis. Permits a licensed owner to convert a riverboat into a permanently moored vessel without propulsion or navigation equipment. Chamber Position: Support. There is no point in requiring these businesses to comply with expensive regulations related to excursion boats when they are permanently moored. The state has become dependent on revenues from these operations and they should not be unduly hampered. Signed by Governor

SB 54 (Third Reading) Local Regulation of Video Service Franchises

Sponsored by Rep. Soliday. Provides that a local unit of government may not: (1) regulate a holder of a certificate to provide, or a provider of, video service; and (2) establish or fund an entity to regulate a holder or provider. **Chamber Position: Support.** Will lead to further deregulation of telecommunications services and eliminate needless local government bureaucracy. **Signed by Governor**

SB 66 (Third Reading) Expansion of Renewable Energy Resources

Sponsored by Rep. Wolkins. Creates additional renewable energy resources for statute that provides financial incentives for clean coal and energy projects. Chamber Position:

Support. The Chamber supports a cost-effective fuel mix including clean coal technologies, natural gas, domestic petroleum, nuclear and renewables. An expansion of renewables that allows flexibility and diversity helps promote the state's renewable portfolio. Signed by Governor

SB 71 (Third Reading) Coal Bed Methane and Other Oil and Gas Issues

Sponsored by Rep. Eberhart. Creates numerous conditions that affect the mining of coal bed methane. **Chamber Position: Support**. The Chamber supports the use of coal bed methane as a viable

source of energy so long as its extraction is done in a safe and environmentally responsible manner. **Signed by Governor**

SB 78 (Conference Committee Report) Identification Requirements for Alcohol Purchases

Sponsored by Rep. Steuerwald. Makes it a Class B misdemeanor for an alcoholic beverage permittee or an employee or agent to recklessly, knowingly or intentionally sell, barter, exchange, provide or furnish another person who is or reasonably appears to be less than 40 years of age an alcoholic beverage without first requiring the person to produce specified identification showing that the person is at least 21 years of age. Chamber Position: Support. The Indiana Chamber supports repeal of Indiana's onerous law requiring persons and businesses selling alcoholic beverages to seek identification/proof of age from all purchasers. Employee training, use of common sense and good faith efforts to seek identification are sufficient. The current (and recently enacted) law has proven unworkable and unpopular. Signed by Governor

SB 86 (Third Reading) Unemployment Benefits Qualifications and Controlled Substances

Sponsored by Rep. Leonard. An applicant for employment that fails or refuses to take a drug test as a condition of employment is deemed to have refused suitable work and is denied unemployment benefits. **Chamber Position: Support.** Persons abusing drugs should not be permitted to collect unemployment benefits. **Signed by Governor**

SB 159 (Third Reading) Streamlined Environmental Rulemaking

Sponsored by Rep. Wolkins. Provides that, if the state adopts a federal rule that later should be invalidated the state has an expedited process to remove the invalidated state rule. Chamber Position: Support. The Chamber supports the repeal of any rule for which the federal directive no longer exists. Such a rule should not be enforced and the state should repeal the rule as soon as possible. Signed by Governor

SB 200 (Third Reading) IDEM Administrative Issuance of Water Permits

Sponsored by Rep. Wolkins. Transfers the power to issue water permits from the Water Pollution Control Board to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM). Also contains provisions related to coal mine general permits. Chamber Position: Support. Satisfies a concern of the EPA to not have the Water Board issue permits but to move that responsibility to IDEM. The Chamber supports the timely and fair issuance of permits. Signed by Governor

SB 292 (Conference Committee Report) Guns in Public Buildings

Sponsored by Rep. Speedy. Prohibits units of local government from maintaining policies prohibiting guns from being brought into public buildings. Chamber Position: Oppose. To protect public safety, a unit of government has the right to prohibit guns from being brought into public buildings. Signed by Governor

SB 346 (Third Reading) Statute of Limitations in Underground Storage Tank Cleanup

Sponsored by Rep. Wolkins. Establishes a clear starting point for the statute of limitations in cases where a cleanup from underground storage tanks is needed. **Chamber Position: Support.** As the court system has no clear and consistent point at which the statute of limitations begins, the efficient cleanup of contaminated properties is impaired. Identifies a consistent date from which the party cleaning up a site may go back (10 years) to recover costs from responsible parties. **Signed by Governor**

SB 381 (Conference Committee Report) Tax Representatives

Sponsored by Rep. Friend. Provides that certain local officials of a county or their employees may not serve as a tax representative for any taxpayer with respect to property subject to property taxes in the same county before the county property tax assessment board of appeals of that county or the Indiana Board of Tax Review. Chamber Position: Support. Reduces the potential for conflicts of interest and appearance of improprieties associated with contractual relationships between tax representatives and county officials involved in property tax appeals. Signed by Governor

SB 411 (Third Reading) Disclosure of Guns in the Workplace

Sponsored by Rep. Eberhart. Prohibits employers from obtaining information as to whether employees are bringing guns to work. **Chamber Position: Oppose**. An employer has the right to know whether someone has brought a firearm onto the employer's property. Current law already provides a remedy for an employee who believes that he has been discriminated against because he brought a firearm onto the employer's property. **Signed by Governor**

SB 433 (Third Reading) Clarification of IDEM Duties and Authority

Sponsored by Rep. Wolkins. Addresses multiple issues related to IDEM activities to create efficiencies, clarification and makes technical corrections. **Chamber Position: Support.** Clarifies and creates efficiencies that will allow IDEM to perform more effectively. **Signed by Governor**

SB 459 (Third Reading) Streamlined Sales and Use Tax Conformity for Internet Sales

Sponsored by Rep. Espich. Brings the state into compliance with the Streamlined Sale and Use Tax Agreement and promotes effort to collect Internet sales tax. **Chamber Position: Support.** The Chamber supports conformance with the streamlined sales tax effort. Indiana's agreement to participate in this national program promotes sales tax law uniformity and the voluntary collection of taxes by Internet retailers. **Signed by Governor**

SB 461 (Conference Committee Report) Health Care Reform Matters

Sponsored by Rep. T. Brown. Makes changes to Medicaid and insurance statutes to comply with the federal Patient

Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA). **Chamber Position: Support.** This bill makes changes to existing law regarding Medicaid and insurance provisions in order to conform to the federal PPACA. **Signed by Governor**

SB 473 (Second Reading Amendment #2) Prohibition on Public-Private Partnerships (P3) With Foreign Companies

Authored by Rep. Reske. Would have prohibited the state from entering into a public-private partnership (P3) agreement with any firm headquartered in a foreign country. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The amendment was unnecessary, protectionist and would have restricted opportunities for significant P3 agreements. **Amendment Failed**

SB 473 (Second Reading Amendment #54) Public-Private Partnership (P3) Authorization Restrictions

Authored by Rep. Crawford. Would have prohibited the state from using any financial proceeds from a P3 agreement without express authorization and appropriation by the Indiana General Assembly. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The amendment was unnecessary and would have undermined the state's financial flexibility and road management authority. **Amendment Failed**

SB 473 (Second Reading Amendment #47) Diverting Public-Private Partnership (P3) Proceeds

Authored by Rep. DeLaney. Would have diverted any P3 proceeds from road- and bridge-building to mass transit, light rail and bicycle paths. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have diverted funds from roads, highways and bridges used to speed commercial activity. **Amendment Failed**

SB 473 (Second Reading Amendment #71) Public-Private Partnership (P3) Approval by Local Planning Entities

Authored by Rep. Austin. Would have required any P3 agreements to be adopted by local metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs). **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have effectively given local MPOs veto authority over any P3 agreement entered into by the state. **Amendment Failed**

SB 473 (Conference Committee Report) Public-Private Partnership (P3) Authorization

Sponsored by Rep. Soliday. Among other provisions, authorizes the governor to enter into public-private partnerships (P3s) for the purpose of building new or expanded roads and transportation infrastructure. Requires State Budget Committee review of any P3 agreements that include tolls while prohibiting tolls on I-69 and existing roadways without explicit authorization from the General Assembly. Chamber Position: Support. Expanded P3 authority will bring much-needed private sector investment to the state's remaining infrastructure needs while spurring economic growth and job creation. Signed by Governor

SB 480 (Third Reading) Telecommunication Data and Deregulation

Sponsored by Rep. Koch. Authorizes the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission (IURC) to delegate authority to its staff

to carry out certain duties and limits the information that communications service providers have to include in applications for certificates of territorial authority. Grants jurisdiction to resolve certain matters concerning video service franchises to the IURC rather than a court with jurisdiction. **Chamber Position: Support.** Furthers telecom reform and safeguards proprietary competitive information in a reasonable way, while promoting further investments in the state's telecommunications infrastructure. **Signed by Governor**

SB 496 (Third Reading) Parental Petitions for School Reorganization

Sponsored by Rep. Noe. Would have empowered parents of students in chronically failing schools to petition to reorganize the school. Chamber Position: Support. Indiana's accountability timeline allows schools to fail for at least six consecutive years before state officials can intervene. This policy would have provided parents several options for intervening sooner than the state timeline and to initiate school reform efforts on behalf of their children. Died

SB 497 (Third Reading) Early High School Graduation, Higher Education Scholarship

Sponsored by Rep. Noe. Allows a high school senior to graduate after three years of high school and to use part of their state tuition support to begin college. Chamber Position: Support. The vast majority of Hoosier jobs now and in the future will require post-secondary education. This proposal will assist and incentivize students who are ready for college-level work to begin those pursuits. Amended into HB 1001 and Signed by Governor

SB 524 (Third Reading) Public Pensions Defined Contribution Plan

Sponsored by Rep. Torr. Establishes a defined contribution plan as an option for new state employees who elect not to become a member of the public employees' retirement fund (PERF). Urges the Legislative Council to assign to the Pension Management Oversight Commission the study of whether to create a defined contribution plan as an option for new employees participating in PERF or teachers' retirement fund (TRF). Chamber Position: Support. Alternatives for new employees to elect a defined contribution plan rather than the current PERF and TRF programs offer the potential for savings and should be considered and implemented to the extent deemed practical. Signed by Governor

SB 526 (Second Reading Amendment #9) Weakening Marion County Government Reforms

Authored by Rep. Pryor. Would have deleted many of the reform measures in SB 526 and watered down the bill. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** This amendment kept the unnecessary role of the ex-officio county commissioners for the board appointments they make for several Marion County boards. **Amendment Failed**

SB 526 (Second Reading Amendment #6) Weakening Marion County Government Reforms

Authored by Rep. Bartlett. Would have put the local government reform measures in this bill up to a voter referendum. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** Would have taken the decisions being considered by legislators and transferred them to voters. The wording on the proposed ballot question favored keeping things the same, rather than for reform. **Amendment Failed**

SB 526 (Conference Committee Report) Marion County Government Reforms

Sponsored by Rep. Hinkle. Would have eliminated advisory boards and transferred township budget oversight to the City-County Council. Also unified Marion County poor relief standards. Made other changes to follow along the lines of UniGov. Chamber Position: Support. Would have made progress in consolidating township functions in Marion County. Died

SB 559 (Third Reading) Conflict of Interest

Sponsored by Rep. Koch. Specifies certain definitions and defenses that apply to the crime of conflict of interest. **Chamber Position: Support.** Good conflict of interest language for public servants to abide by. **Signed by Governor**

SB 575 (Second Reading Amendment #75) Limiting Teacher Collective Bargaining

Authored by Rep. Behning. Added prohibitions banning bargaining on teacher evaluations and on contracts that extend beyond the state budget biennium. Chamber Position: Support. Bargaining of teacher evaluation provisions would have effectively eliminated school districts' ability to improve teacher evaluations. Given that school districts do not know the level of their base funding beyond the current state budget, they should not make financial commitments in their operations that could exceed the funds available to them. Amendment Prevailed

SB 575 (Second Reading Amendment #54) Teacher Collective Bargaining

Authored by Rep. Cheatham. Would have allowed collective bargaining of school funds other than general operating dollars and loosened the definitions of deficit financing, which is prohibited in collective bargaining. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The wages and wage-related benefits negotiated in teacher contracts should not extend beyond the funds that have been appropriated for such purposes. **Amendment Failed**

SB 575 (Second Reading Amendment #17) Teacher Collective Bargaining

Authored by Rep. Kersey. Would have grandfathered contracts that had been negotiated prior to the 1973 collective bargaining law. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** The provisions that this amendment would have incorporated are nearly four decades old and ought to be allowed to finally expire so that local labor agreements can begin anew. **Amendment Failed**

SB 575 (Second Reading Amendment #25) Teacher Collective Bargaining

Authored by Rep. VanDenburgh. Would have restored working conditions to the issues that are included in the collective bargaining process. **Chamber Position: Oppose.** It is provisions like these that have paralyzed school leaders and would have continued to prevent school leaders from managing their schools. **Amendment Failed**

SB 575 (Second Reading Amendment #28) Teacher Collective Bargaining

Authored by Rep. VanDenburgh. Would have subjected teacher evaluation to collective bargaining. Chamber Position: Oppose. Unions have steadfastly opposed the use of student academic data in the evaluation of teachers and would have used the collective bargaining process to prevent what is finally to be allowed through state law. Amendment Failed

SB 575 (Second Reading Amendment #26) Teacher Collective Bargaining

Authored by Rep. VanDenburgh. Would have subjected hours of school operation to collective bargaining. Chamber Position: Oppose. The past inclusion of hours in collective bargaining has been used as a detrimental tool for keeping school leaders from managing their schools effectively and efficiently. Amendment Failed

SB 575 (Third Reading) Limiting Teacher Collective Bargaining

Sponsored by Rep. Behning. Limits collective bargaining to wages and benefits. **Chamber Position: Support.** Scales back a range of union practices that prevent schools from operating effectively and efficiently. **Signed by Governor**

SB 576 (Conference Committee Report) Worker's Compensation Administration

Sponsored by Rep. Lehman. Requires all members of the Worker's Compensation Board be attorneys in good standing admitted to the practice of law in Indiana. Requires a health care provider to file a claim for payment with the board not later than one year after the last date the provider provided services to an injured employee. Requires the board to establish a schedule of fees and charges for the resolution of health care provider claims. Chamber Position: Support. Most of the changes would enable the board to operate in a more efficient manner. The time limits for filing claims will hopefully lead to quicker resolution of claims. Signed by Governor

SB 589 (Third Reading) Corporate Income Tax Rate Reduction

Sponsored by Rep. Turner. Reduced the corporate income tax rate from 8.5% to 6.5%; phased in over four years. **Chamber Position: Support.** This is an important effort to make Indiana even more competitive by bringing its corporate rate more in line with other states. Amended into HB 1004 and **Signed by Governor**
